Soil health programs for farmers

Cover Crop Seed Mix Trials

We are looking for farms that grow annual crops like corn and vegetables to try out different cover crop mixes all across NH. This will help us determine when, where, why and how some mixes work better than others. We are experimenting with complex mixes that have multiple benefits to soil fertility and health, crop health, and crop management. We have a limited quantity of free seed available to eligible farmers, and we can also assist with bulk buying seed mixes. No-till Corn Planting: rentals and retrofits

Not sure what do to with those cover crops in the spring? Are you interested in saving time and tractor passes? NHACD has purchased 4 no-till roller crimper corn planters, for planting corn directly into a standing cover crop. The roller crimpers, usually with the help of herbicide, will terminate the cover crop to create a weed-blocking, moisture-retaining mat. This equipment was funded by the NH NRCS Conservation Innovation Grant. Contact your local Conservation District to learn more about trying this equipment next spring!

Additionally, the Conservation Districts are offering funding and technical assistance to farmers interested in adapting their existing corn planters to no-till planters. The deadline to sign up for this program for 2019 is February 1st, 2019.

No-till Management for Low/No Spray Vegetable Farmers

Cover crops and other soil health practices are not just for corn growers with lots of acres. If you have a fruit and/or vegetable farm of any size, and you are interested in reducing tillage while also limiting the use of pesticides, you may be interested in our statewide "No-till for low spray vegetable farmers" project.
